

Dear Authors!

Please use the following reference template for annotating studies. Please note, we do not accept articles with another type of annotation.

BASIC RULES

- The maximum length of the paper is 40.000 characters including spaces and footnotes
- Font: Times New Roman
- Font size in text: 12
- Font size in footnotes: 10
- Line spacing in text: simple
- Line spacing in footnotes: simple
- In all cases, use footnotes (i.e. no endnotes and no in-between notes)!
- No bibliography is required for studies! Write out all bibliographical references at the first citation of a reference, use abbreviations thereafter (see Examples). In the case of multiple authors, separate names with a dash (–) while using a punctuation mark. Hyphens (-) and long dashes (—) are not acceptable.
- Within the note, each item is separated by a semicolon.
- In the case of archives and research institutions, the first reference should include the full title in the original language. For example: Magyar Nemzeti Levéltár Országos Levéltára (hereafter MNL OL). The abbreviation is used in the following.
- In the notes, give the exact page numbers, do not use abbreviations for pages (e.g. p. or pp.).
- For repeated references, the original title is abbreviated. If the reference is the same as the the previous one use the following form: Ibid. page number.

- **For instance:**

Ormos – Majoros: Európa a nemzetközi küzdőtéren, 35.
Ibid. 40.

If the page number is the same, please use simply the following form:
Ibid.

- The titles of non-English works do not need to be translated into English, please leave them in the original language.

EXAMPLES

Book, monographs – first description

- Ormos Mária – Majoros István: Európa a nemzetközi küzdőtéren. Budapest, 2003. 122.
- Applebaum, Anne: Vasfüggöny. Kelet-Európa megtörése, 1944–1956. Budapest, 2014. 35.
- Schroeder, Paul: Metternich Diplomacy at it's Zenith, 1820–1823. Austin, 1962. 200.

If you are referring to the whole book, you do not need to write out the full text of the volume, but simply refer to it as follows:

- Schroeder, Paul: Metternich Diplomacy at it's Zenith, 1820–1823. Austin, 1962.
